# American Diabetes Association Tour de Cure

Hello Everyone!

Thank you so much for supporting me in this year's Tour de Cure bike event helping me exceed my goal of \$200 (\$246)! The ride was

challenging, but a rewarding experience and a great time! Because of your generosity and support, we are able to further the mission of the American Diabetes Association: *to prevent and cure diabetes and to improve the lives of all those affected by diabetes*. The dollars we raised will support the vital research, programs, and advocacy efforts that the American Diabetes Association provides to over 29 million Americans living with diabetes and their families. Thanks again for your help and support. My riding buddy, Chris, wrote about our bike ride experience. With his consent, I want to share his words of our experience ...

I know it's been a while since I sent out a request for your support on raising money for the Tour de Cure ride in Longmont which helps raise money for diabetes. Yesterday was the ride and I thought I'd send you an update on how it went since you sponsored me, helped me or you have diabetes.

Watching the weather all week, Paul and I gave in and realized it was going to be yet another hot ride, much like the Denver Century was back in June. We took the camper up and stayed at St. Vrain State Park in Longmont to save driving back and forth before and after the ride. Paul and I were up early Saturday morning and made our way over to the event by 0530. After a long pre-ceremony event they kicked off the ride about 0610.

The morning started out pretty cool and partly cloudy which was nice considering what we knew we had ahead of us. The group start wasn't our idea of a good time though. People were already jockeying for position and trying to get ahead of the pack. We sat back and just let them do their thing. After the first 8-10 miles it appeared the pack was pretty much spread out and the nerves of getting caught up in something were gone. We found a group to pull with for a while and let them break the wind for us to draft behind. The few miles we spent with them helped us to keep a good pace at minimal effort.



We stopped at all but 2 of the aide stations along the route. Most of them were to top off the one bottle we'd already finished and the other bottle later in the day was for cold water to constantly pour on ourselves. The heat was getting out of control and we still had a long way to go. Our trip up along Horsetooth reservoir found us climbing 10-11% grades; hills I didn't know we'd be climbing up. We knew at some point what goes up must come down, and down we went! I was able to break a previous personal best of 48.6 mph on a bike by blasting down this hill peaking out at 52.36 mph. The bike felt stable and the speed felt amazing. We wanted to turn around and do it again.

The event was really well staffed, the aide stations were in great places for the most part and spaced out perfectly. By the time our cold water was getting warm we were able to stop and fill them back up again. We met some great people along the way, took the draft from other riders to relax and gave the draft for other riders to relax. At one point I sat in the car when Kristen and the boys met up with us at an aide station to cool off. I had a pretty bad cause of heat exhaustion at

the Denver Century and I didn't want to go through that again. The 5 minutes I spent in the A/C made me feel like a completely new person.

All in all Paul and I finished the 103.37 miles with an elevation gain over 4500ft in 8:31 including all aide station stops. Total riding time was 7:24 so we ended up stopping for just over 1hr 7mins. The sun definitely played a major role in this ride but we were determined to finish the ride and get everybody their money's worth. I thank you for the donations you made allowing us to ride and we hope your money goes to good use with the American Diabetes Association.

## National Ski Club News *(Reprinted -National Ski Club Newsletter –June July August)*



**FOUNDER OF SNOWBIRD DIES AT 85** Dick Bass, partner and chairman of Snowbird Ski and Summer Resort, died Sunday, July 26, 2015 at the age of 85 in Dallas, Texas. Bass spent 44 years building Snowbird into a world-renowned, year-round destination mountain resort which he co-founded the resort in 1971 with Ted Johnson, and maintained sole ownership of the resort until selling the majority interest in Snowbird to Ian Cumming in May 2014.

### **CANYONS -- PARK CITY MOUNTAIN RESORT COMBINE UNDER THE NAME PARK CITY**

Vail resorts is combining Park City Mountain Resort with the Canyons to be called simply; Park City Mountain Resort. Vail purchased Park City last year for \$182.5 million. The new logo features the red color used in the Park City Mountain logo and the infinity sign from the Canyons logo. Although the signs say only "Park City," the Canyons name will be sticking around only in signage on that side of the mountain that will say, "Park City Canyons Village. Vail Resorts is spending \$50 million on upgrades, including a gondola connecting the resorts, two lifts and new restaurants -- all of which are expected to be ready by the 2015-2016 ski season.

**RMSP+ PASS HOLDERS NOW GET ACCESS TO ALASKA'S ALYESKA RESORT** The Rocky Mountain Super Pass+ (RMSP+) now includes Alyeska Resort in Alaska, located 40 miles from Anchorage, Alyeska. This addition offers RMSP+ pass holders the opportunity to satisfy their sense of adventure with three days of skiing at the full-service resort. The RMSP+ now covers five Colorado resorts; Winter Park Resort, Steamboat, Copper Mountain, Eldora, and Crested Butte.



**PURGATORY IS PURGATORY AGAIN** The southern Colorado ski area of Purgatory – which has spent the past decade or so named 'Durango Mountain Resort' has a new owner who has decided to change the ski area's title back to its original name – Purgatory. Local businessman James Coleman is the resort's new owner and he is investing in a new high speed quad chairlift to replace chair #8 for the coming ski season – the resort's 50th season.

**\$10 MILLION IN IMPROVEMENTS IN SOUTHWEST RESORTS** Durango businessman James Coleman announced he plans to make \$10 million in improvements across the four mountains he now has interests in. Purgatory will get a new high-speed quad to replace the Legends Lift and two new trails off Ray's Ridge and additional snowmaking. Sipapu Ski and Summer Resort near Taos will get a new quad lift to service beginning and intermediate terrain and a new trail will be built under the lift -- plus 5 acres of skiable terrain will be added through the extending other areas. Pajarito Mountain, near Los Alamos, New Mexico, will get a new beginners trail, and Arizona Snowbowl will get its first new chairlift in 30 years as the Humphreys Peak Lift is being replaced by a quad.



**U.S. SKI TEAM TO OPERATE NASTAR** Ski Area Management Magazine reports that the U.S. Ski Team will take operational control of NASTAR ski race series through a partnership with the program's owner, Active Interest Media (AIM) -- the owners of Ski and Skiing Magazines. NASTAR is located at 115 resorts nationwide, and has more than 165,000 racer days each year. AIM will continue to lead the promotional and marketing efforts for NASTAR, and become an official sponsor of the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Teams under the new agreement.

**SUN PEAKS ADDS MORE RUNS** British Columbia's Sun Peaks Resort will add two new trails and increased glading for next ski season. The two new runs in the West Morrisey area will continue to build out the challenging Laundromat area in anticipation of the planned West Morrisey chairlift.



## MORE National Ski Club News (It's been a very busy off-season!)



### CRESTED BUTTE SKI AREA EXPANSION PLAN WINS INITIAL APPROVAL

Crested Butte Mountain Resort (CBMR) has received official approval for their plans to extend their skiable area by 500 acres from the U.S. Forest Service. This permission, for expansion, in an area known as Teocalli Drainage at the back of Crested Butte Mountain, means that an 'environmental review' of the project through the US National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) can begin. That process does not guarantee approval and it could take two years before a draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is released. The resort is already working with ski area designers the SE Group on a draft EIS. If successful, the expansion plans would see one existing lift upgraded to a chairlift and two new lifts accessing additional advanced and intermediate terrain.

**SKI RESORT ENERGY PROJECTS** New York signs solar energy agreement for Belleayre, Gore Mountain, and Whiteface Ski Area. The state of New York and the Olympic Regional Development Authority (ORDA) have entered into a 25-year power purchase agreement with San Diego's Borrego Solar to supply solar energy to state-owned Belleayre, Gore Mountain, and Whiteface ski areas. Purchasing solar energy is expected to reduce the resort's one million dollar energy bill by more than \$213,000 during the first year.



Jiminy Peak Mountain Resort, the first ski area in the U.S. to install a wind turbine in 2007, is partnering with solar project developer and owner Nexamp to construct a 2.3 megawatt community solar facility. Construction officially starts Aug. 5, and the facility is expected to be online by late fall. The solar facility will be the largest community solar project in the Northeast. Combined with their existing 1.5 megawatt wind turbine and a 75 kilowatt hour co-generation unit, the added solar power will enable the resort to offset 90 percent of its energy needs from renewable resources.

**NATIONALLY, U. S. SKIER DAYS WERE DOWN** Skier visits nationally fell to 53.6 million in 2014-15, marking the second worst season in 16 years for visits, largely due to dismal snow conditions in the far West.

**COLORADO SKIER DAYS DOWN BY HALF A PERCENT** Skier visits at the 21 member ski resorts of Colorado Ski Country USA (CSCUSA) totaled 7.1 million during the 2014/15 season, about one-half of 1 percent fewer than last year's record season and 6.5 percent more than the five-year-average. Vail Resorts is not a member of the organization and are therefore not included in the total. But, in Colorado, ski lodging revenue was up 4.6%.

**NEW MEXICO HAD ALMOST ONE MILLION SKIER DAYS LAST SEASON** The Ski New Mexico organization reports that New Mexico skier visits had 909,715 for 2014- 2015, up 19.4% or 176,316 ski-days more than last season, and those skiers spent over \$500 in the state -- almost \$100 million more than last season.

**VERMONT SKIER DAYS UP DRAMATICALLY** The Vermont Ski Areas Association reported that ski areas in Vermont had a record-breaking 4,670,903 million visits during the 2014-15 season. Early openings at ski areas, recent capital investments in new snowmaking equipment, and a series of snowstorms that had Vermont leading continental U.S. in snowfall were all credited for boosting overall skier and snowboarder visitation. "A near-perfect winter in Vermont allowed for both early openings and extended season operations, leading to the best season on record," said Parker Riehle, president of VSAA. The season also generated nearly \$220 million in economic activity in the state, representing a 4 percent increase over last year. Room and meal taxes were up 8 percent, according to the association. The strong snow and record visits were also welcome news to the Vermont economy, netting nearly \$220 million for the state's coffers in winter season revenues from

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the sales tax and the rooms & meals tax. Overall, those revenues increased 4%, with the rooms and meals tax revenue alone topping last season by 8%.



**WHISTLER BLACKCOMB IS NOW SMOKE-FREE** Whistler Blackcomb has a new smoke-free policy which prohibits smoking anywhere on Whistler Blackcomb property, including lift lines, chairlifts, gondolas, ski runs, hiking trails, valley base areas, parking lots, Whistler Mountain Bike Park trails and all Whistler Blackcomb bar and restaurants, including their patios. **JACKSON HOLE** plans to complete three years of expansion and construction in time for the start of its 50th season next winter. The area will include three new runs along with gladed terrain. A new high speed quad lift providing advanced and expert skiers access to an area called Granite which has so far been accessible only via hiking. The Teton Lift, a new high-speed quad, that will carry skiers and riders 1,650 vertical feet (495m) to an area of around 200 acres. The reason it's a topic of conversation now is because of how dramatically it will shift how people approach some of the best—and potentially dangerous—backcountry terrain in North America. When it starts spinning next year, the chair will deposit skiers less than a hundred feet away from the resort's northern boundary. This radical terrain—known as Granite Canyon—lies out of bounds within Grand Teton National Park. Current access is through a few different bootpacks and a series of backcountry gates.



**SQUAW VALLEY / ALPINE MEADOWS TO CONNECT** Squaw Valley USA has reached an agreement with the owner of the land between Squaw Valley and Alpine Meadows to create a base-to-base

gondola between the two mountains to form a lift-connected area of 6,000 acres! "For decades, skiers and riders have talked about connecting these two world-class resorts," said Andy Wirth, president and CEO of Squaw Valley Ski Holdings, LLC. "Over the last four years, we've made significant improvements to enhance the skier experience at both Squaw Valley and Alpine Meadows. The base-to-base gondola will offer our guests the ability to easily explore and experience the unique attributes of these two mountains via a brand new aerial connection, while simultaneously reducing vehicle traffic between them." Plans to connect the two mountains have commenced, and include the possibility of a high-speed, detachable gondola that would operate between the base of Squaw Valley and the base of Alpine Meadows, traveling over the KT-22 Peak. There are no plans currently being contemplated to allow skiing or other non-skiing activities along the lift route or on the terrain located between the two resorts. The estimated completion date of the project will be subject to Placer County and U.S. Forest Service approvals once applications are submitted. The planned base-to-base gondola will be designed to minimize the overall footprint and potential visual impacts to the adjacent Granite Chief Wilderness, as well as maintain the scenic beauty of the area. **SQUAW VALLEY** to upgrade the Siberia Express chairlift from a high-speed quad to a six pack this summer. In addition, the lift has been designed in a way that will improve its ability to operate during inclement weather." The Siberia Express chairlift is one of the most popular lifts at Squaw Valley, and is used primarily by intermediate and advanced level skiers and riders to access terrain including Siberia Bowl, Mainline and the Mainline Terrain Park.



**SNOWMASS TO REPLACE HIGH ALPINE LIFT WITH \$8 MILLION QUAD**

Aspen Skiing Company will replace and realign the High Alpine lift on Snowmass. The estimated cost of this project is nearly \$8 million. The new High speed quad has a ride time of 5.6 minutes, down from an 11 minute ride on the old chairlift. Construction will begin this summer and the new lift and improvements will debut for the 2015-16 ski season. Aspen Skiing Company will install snowmaking equipment on two existing trails, and implement additional trail and glade construction projects this summer after receiving approvals from the United States Forest Service today. The upgraded lift will be realigned, allowing the area, already one of America's largest, to add 63 acres more gladed terrain – over the next five years.

### BSC Trips Cancellation Policy

- 1.The Club does not intend to unduly penalize a trip participant who cancels from a BSC trip. However, other trip participants should not have to incur additional costs due to your cancellation.
- 2.Deposits and payments made toward the trip reservations being cancelled will be held until such time as a determination can be made that the Club or trip participants will not incur additional costs due to non-recoverable costs.
- 3.Non-recoverable costs are defined as those that are associated with the trip that due to contractual obligations cannot be recovered when the individual cancels his/her trip.
